In 2017, the District was awarded a Bronze SWANA Excellence Award for the Collection Center. In 2017, the City of Lorain, the only remaining political subdivision in Lorain County to collect curbside recyclables and waste manually, upgraded their system to automated cart collection after successful discussions with the District. The new system was rolled out in Spring of 2017. The Consortium continues to meet on a quarterly basis and has plans to go out for bid in 2018. The District has been working on expanding the consortium and made presentations to local communities. The Host Community Agreement was renegotiated with Republic and extended to 2019.

Operation of the Collection Center had challenges in 2017-18. The District prepared a report on operational efficiencies; many of those recommendations are being implemented in 2018.

Considering the calendar year and the remainder of the year yet to come, please discuss anticipated activities or challenges and how the District may address them: *

The District is in the process of developing its Solid Waste Management Plan Update, which is due to Ohio EPA on 10/02/2018. The District is continuing to meet with the policy committee on a monthly basis to review progress on the Plan. The District's Director, Keith Bailey, will be retiring in 2018. The future leadership of the District has not been identified at this time. The County's administration is managing the change in District staffing. It is uncertain at this time how District operations may be impacted.

In 2016, the District secured a site for the organics facility. The District went out for bid to hire a consultant to assist with the site feasibility and to develop a business plan for the operation. The District hired SCS Engineers to complete this assessment for the business plan as the first step. The draft business plan is to be completed in May 2016. Following the development of the business plan which is Phase I the District if it is determined to be a "Go" will develop the license application. Phase III will be to hire an operator or determine if the District can operate the facility. This project continued in 2017.

After filling in the table below, please provide analysis regarding why actual diversion in the report year(recycling and composting) may be different than projected diversion from the SWMD's current Plan. *

Actual residential/commercial recycling is significantly higher than projected in the Plan. Main factors that contributed to the increase include: the City of Lorain transitioned from bags to automated carts, resulting in a substantial increase in the city's curbside recycling; additional compost tonnage was obtained from research performed for an organics study; and Republic reported significant increases in tonnage compared to previous years. In 2016, Republic reported accepting 35,428 tons from Lorain County for all sectors. In 2017, Republic reported accepting 43,201 tons for all sectors. Actual industrial recycling is higher than Plan projections as well. The increase was mainly caused by operational changes reported by one of the largest industries in Lorain County.
